Introduction

The Trade Council at the Danish Embassy in Brussels is a strategic partner to Danish companies and subsidiaries in the EU, Belgium and Luxembourg.

As part of the Trade Council's services in EU public affairs, this catalogue aims to provide general information on EU funding for projects and programmes within the tech/digitalisation, energy, and life science sectors. EU funding is available to research organisations, public entities, NGOs and private companies engaging in activities that serve EU policies.

The mapping is thematically structured as per the MFF 2021-2027, which you can find <u>here</u>, and includes information on the relevant sector, the management type, the project phase, and the application process.

Management Types

While the EU provides funding for specific programmes or projects, it is not always directly involved in the day-to-day management. The Member States are in charge of the implementation of the majority of the EU budget, but the European Commission has the ultimate responsibility for its execution.

All programmes that are funded by the EU budget fall under one of three types of implementation, depending on the nature of the funding: *direct management, shared management, indirect management.*

<u>Direct Management:</u> EU funding managed directly by the European Commission.

Under direct management, the European Commission is solely responsible for all steps in a programme's implementation, from launching the calls for proposals and making payments to assessing the results of the projects. These tasks are carried out directly by the Commission's departments, in the EU delegations or through EU executive agencies. Programmes implemented in direct management account for approximately 20% of the EU budget 2021-2027.

<u>Example:</u> An example of a direct management programme is the Competitiveness of Enterprises and Small and Medium-sized Enterprises (COSME) programme, which has the objective of supporting the creation and expansion of SMEs. In the case of an applicant entrepreneur looking for financial backing from the EU, the contact and managing department would be found in the European Innovation Council and SMEs Executive Agency, which run the COSME programme.

Calls for projects under direct management are published on the <u>Funding and Tenders Portal (SEDIA)</u>. Applicants can find a thorough how-to-guide on the process <u>here</u>.

Shared Management: EU funding managed jointly by the European Commission and national authorities.

Under shared management, both the European Commission and national authorities in Member States, such as ministries and public institutions, are in charge of running the programme. Programmes implemented in shared management account for around 70% of the EU budget 2021-2027.

The Member States' administrations (at national, regional and local level) choose which projects to finance and take responsibility for day-to-day management. In collaboration with the Member States, the Commission ensures that the projects are successfully concluded, and resources are utilised efficiently.

<u>Example:</u> A farmer in the EU, that wants to start a project growing organic tomatoes, would be eligible to apply for funds under the Common Agricultural Policy (CAP). For that, they would have to go through their national Ministry of Agriculture, or an equivalent institution, which would be in charge of managing the funds for their project on behalf of the EU.

<u>Indirect Management:</u> EU funding managed by partner organisations or other authorities inside or outside the EU.

Under indirect management, the funding programmes are partly or fully implemented with the support of external entities, e.g. national authorities or international organisations. The majority of the EU budget allocated by indirect management is to humanitarian aid and international development. Programmes implemented under indirect management account for approximately 10% of the EU budget 2021-2027.

<u>Example:</u> The European Commission delegated financial support to fight the Ebola outbreak in West Africa and the earthquake in Nepal in 2015.

Three phases of processes in funding

To clarify which funds are available for which phases of applicants' projects and organisations, the overview distinguishes between three phases: research, development, and commercialisation.

Research

The research phase focuses on exploring new scientific or technological concepts and generating fundamental knowledge. It aims to understand underlying principles without yet targeting a specific commercial outcome.

Development

The development phase involves designing, building, and refining prototypes or processes based on the research results. The goal is to translate promising concepts into functional technologies or products ready for testing.

Commercialisation

The commercialisation phase focuses on bringing the validated solution to the market. It includes scaling up production, marketing, and establishing business models or partnerships to ensure sustainable use and impact.

This includes a particular focus on SMEs. Investments under the Digital Europe Programme support the EU's twin objectives of the green transition and the digital transformation, and strengthen the EU's resilience and strategic autonomy.

The financial support is offered primarily through grants up to 100% of eligible costs contingent on activities, and a bonus system that considers SMEs, mid-caps, and connection to a PESCO project.

Other EU Funding Options

European Investment Bank (EIB)

The EIB offers loans, guarantees, equity investments and advisory services. Its financial products and services are in support of the economic, social, and environmental objectives of the European Union.

Support for SMEs is a major priority for the EIB Group. In 2024, the EIB Group provided over €16 billion for SMEs through its intermediaries (commercial banks, National Promotional Banks and Institutions, leasing companies, private equity funds etc.).

The EIB also lends directly to mid-caps (250-3000 employees) for R&D investment.

INVEST EU

The InvestEU Programme is composed of three parts, the InvestEU Fund, the InvestEU Advisory Hub and the InvestEU Portal.

The programme is implemented by the EIB.

- Social investment and skills

European Investment Fund (EIF)

Its main mission is to support SMEs and help them access finance, by working with financial intermediaries across Europe, including funds, banks, guarantee and microfinance institutions.
